Military: The military developed a strategy called Operation Maximum Candor that shaped its relationship with the news media. What was the strategy's goal? How did it affect reporters on the ground?

Government: War presents challenges for reporters pursuing the truth. Find at least four examples in the exhibit where the U.S. government intentionally lied or misled the public through the news media.

Why did government/military officials do this?

Explain the short- and long-term effects of these actions on reporters and coverage of the war.

Ethics: Journalists have professional standards – often called a code of ethics – to help them decide what is the right and responsible thing to do on the job. Pick one of the two iconic photos from the Vietnam War shown below. List the pros and cons for publishing that image.

AT HOME/IN THE CLASSROOM – Conduct an Interview

Interview an older adult (family member, friend, neighbor, teacher, etc.) who was alive during the Vietnam War to get a personalized account of the war that divided the nation. Use these questions to help guide your conversation. Then prepare a short report to share with your class and/or the Newseum.
